
Did you know?







"Protecting those who protect our Nation."

he Pentagon Police Canine (K-9) Unit was established in July 1998 to take a more proactive approach to the growing threat of terrorism. The K-9 teams assigned to the Pentagon provide protection support for the Secretary of Defense, visiting dignitaries, and all Department of Defense personnel at the Pentagon and in the National Capital Region. In addition to numerous proactive assignments for explosive detection, the K-9 Unit also provides support to other law enforcement agencies throughout the National Capital Region.

The growth of the K-9 Unit from only four teams to its current size has been surpassed by the functional growth. The program has evolved from the original military working dog detection model into a blend of multiple training and detection methodologies that took the best practices from existing programs and tailored them to meet the Pentagon Force Protection Agency's (PFPA) unique requirements.

The K-9 Unit is comprised of specially trained dogs used to detect explosives and person-borne improvised explosives devices. The Unit is organized into teams (canine and handler) that provide both proactive and reactive law enforcement functions designed to ensure a safe working environment at the Pentagon reservation and other DoD delegated facilities. Members of the K-9 Unit conduct security sweeps of delivery, construction, unattended vehicles, suspicious packages or bomb threats, and official ceremonies and functions. PFPA has the only Person-Borne Improvised Explosive Device Detection (PBIED) program in the DoD that has won numerous K-9 Olympic events in detection.

After the canines are selected and tested, they are paired up with their respective handlers immediately to begin building a strong bond. K-9 teams then go through an extensive six-month training course covering explosive imprinting, search principles, and obedience. Upon completion of the course, they complete a certification that consists of two phases. Phase one is the odor recognition test, which confirms that the canine can identify several explosive compounds and the handler can identify the change of behavior, all while working as a team. Phase two is operational, which consist of real-world searches of four areas: vehicles, buildings, luggage, and open area.

PFPA canine and handler teams require more than 200 hours a year of training together to maintain operational status. The canines receive their annual certification from the International Police Working Dog Association. The K-9 Unit has participated in and placed in multiple skills competitions to include Iron Dog Competitions, United States Police Canine Association (USPCA) Detection Trials, and North American Police Working Dog Association (NAPWDA) Detection Trials.
